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#### MATERIALS REQUIRED FOR EACH CLASS

#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course is designed around various hands on projects with a variety of tasks. The projects are in direct correlation to the Alberta Education Program of Studies. The Program of Studies categories the leanings for this course as:

#### **Drawing: General Outcomes:**

- I. Combine description, expression and cognition in the drawing process.
- 2. Develop and refine drawing skills and styles.
- 3. Investigate varieties of expression in making images.
- 4. Use the vocabulary and techniques of art criticism to analyze their own works.
- 5. Draw for confidence and consolidation of Head to Hand skills
- 6. Become aware of the relationship between function and form in artistic productions.
- 7. Achiever personal style.
- 8. Exhibit a personal style through in-depth studies.
- 9. Use the vocabulary and techniques of art criticism to analyze and evaluate their own works in relation to the works of professional artists.

#### **Compositions: General Outcomes:**

- 1. Extend their knowledge of and familiarity with the elements and principles of design through practice in composing two and three dimensional images.
- 2. Solve teacher directed problems of unity and emphasis in creating compositions.
- 3. Solve teacher directed spatial problems of movement and direction in the creation of compositions.
- 4. Use the vocabulary of art critism to develop and accept analyses of their own work.
- 5. Experiment with various representational formats.
- 6. Be conscious of the emotional impact that is caused and shaped by a work of art.
- 7. Use non-traditional approaches to create compositions in both two and three dimensions.
- 8. Solve teacher and students developed problems by varying the dominance of design elements for specific visual effects.
- 9. Use the vocabulary and techniques of art critism to interpret and evaluate both their own works and the works of others.
- 10. Demonstrate control over various components and compositions.
- II. Use personal experiences as sources for image making
- 12. Develop and solve design problems.
- 13. Use the vocabulary and techniques of art criticism to analyze and evaluate their own works and the works of professional artists.

- I. Investigate the process of abstracting form from a source in order to create objects and images.
- 2. Compare the image content of certain periods.
- 3. Recognize that while the sources of images are universal, the formation of an image is influenced by the artist's choice of medium, the time and culture.
- 4. Investigate the impact of technology on the intentions and productions of the artist.
- 5. Research selected artists and periods to discover factors in the artists' environment that influenced their personal visions.
- 6. Question sources of images that are personally relevant or significant to them in contemporary culture.

# SKETCHBOOOKS

In this course there is no final exam!!! However, Sketchbooks are worth 30% of your grade so treat this assignment very seriously.

ALL STUDENTS WILL BE EXPECTED TO HAVE A SKETCHBOOK IN HAND BY SEC-OND WEEK OF THE SEMESTER AND HAVE IT WITH THEM FOR EVERY CLASS. (THIS IS THE PAPER YOU WILL BE USING TO DRAFT ALL MAJOR ASSIGNMENTS.)

Sketchbook assignments will be delivered with the expectation of ONE finished sketch a week. (The more you draw the more effective your techniques will become, so drawing more than one will be ideal and show in your final grade), The idea or concept will align with the concept we are learning that week in class. This will take at least an hour each week to complete. This is where the practicing of techniques, elements, principles will take place. You will be able to use your imagination to show you understand what we are learning in class in very unique ways. There are no limitations to what you will create and explore.

In addition to a weekly piece there will be added in-class and homework assignments added to the Sketchbook. You will print the date assigned, the assignment name and a short review of your piece of art on the next page in your Sketchbook. The work is a completed project so you should not write on the page with the artwork.

There will also be a component of 4 individual self directed sketches. These sketches are of your choice and can be done through any chosen media: (but is not limited to the listed media): drawing, collage, assemblage, though, poetry, charcoal, pencil crayons. You will date these drawings, list the media and explain a little of the idea on the next page.

When marking the final draft I will be looking to make sure weekly projects, in-class and homework, and your four self directed sketches have been completed. In these pieces I will be looking to see that you are growing as an artist, using techniques that have been offered to you, honest effort. A sketchbook drawing will take you a minimum of an hour so if you rush it will be obvious in your work. When choosing your projects keep in mind all entries need to be school appropriate.

### **Classroom Rules/ Expectations**

- Willing to listen to and respect the ideas and opinions of fellow classmates. Rude and inappropriate gestures will not be tolerated. When it is your turn to share with the class you must do so in a polite and courteous way.
- It is your responsibility to be punctual, as class will begin when the bell rings. You are expected to
